I was lucky enough to win a Doris Wilkinson bursary last October. I'm not in a position to do a residential course so I've chosen to do a series of half day and day craft courses instead. So far, I've done Papercut Lanterns and Introduction to Marbling with L&S Crafts (<u>https://landscrafts.mailchimpsites.com/</u>, who run workshops in York and at Howsham Mill) and Textile Landscapes with the ever reliable Council-run York Learning.



Laura and Sam (L&S crafts) are excellent teachers, and specialise in simple crafts that are easily learnable to ensure that every participant can achieve pleasing results very quickly. The textile landscape day was also expertly run but it was rather above my head and I didn't really do very well. But that's the good thing about taster sessions - you can find out if you're good at something without having to buy a lot of expensive materials. I think I shall confine my interaction with multi-media embroidery to enjoying other people's efforts in future!

I find my job, and the post pandemic world, to be very stressful and although I am an avid crafter, I rarely make time to do much. Winning the bursary has forced me to focus on booking and attending events, and having time to take a

break from life and to relax doing something I love has been so beneficial for my mental health. So we are now at the junction between summer and autumn, the start of the academic year and nearly the end of the Federation's. We hope many of you will come to the Autumn Council Meeting next month and enjoy yourselves, to make it a success.

One of the essential features of the WI, as evidenced before and more significantly since early 2020, is the simple but potent theme of fellowship. By definition promoting this is a team effort. Fellowship takes many forms, from tea and a bun to participation in crafts, clubs and campaigns. A good example is provided by the Penpal Exchange set up by Valerie Hughes, as described on page 2 of the August Newsletter.

Following on from the Autumn Council Meeting, our Science of Christmas events (page 4 of the August Newsletter) will also be putting fellowship into action.

Meanwhile our Chairman Sarah and I were the lucky recipients of hospitality from Brayton WI, who celebrated their 22nd anniversary and the Queen's Platinum Jubilee together in June, in fine style (page 5 of the August Newsletter); we had a wonderful time.

At the national level, this year's resolution will be in the process of being incorporated in an action pack; while at the same time preparations are underway for the resolution selection meeting on 4th October, after which several will be put to the WIs for consideration in advance of voting in 2023. It is always interesting to see what members have come up with.

At the international level, at last month's virtual coffee morning with NFWI's Public Affairs department (now a quarterly event) we had a lively account of attendance at April's UN Ocean Conference in Lisbon: some very useful contacts were made, including possible sources of funding, and the WI's presence at that forum was duly noted - consistent with our involvement in climate change action measures, as authorised by members.

The A-Z of Climate Change. "L" is for L.E.D.

L.E.D. stands for light emitting diode. Conventional light bulbs incorporate a tungsten filament which glows white hot when heated by passing electricity though it. Such bulbs are short-lived because the filament burns out eventually and much of the energy produced is lost as heat. LED lights are a completely new technology, though the phenomenon had been observed as early as 1907. A diode is a structure comprising a chemical compound between two metals (called a semiconductor). Light is given out when electricity is passed across the diode. Gallium and Arsenic are the metals. Aluminium may also be incorporated forming an aluminium-gallium-arsenic diode. In 2014, three scientists together won the Nobel Prize for Physics for producing the first low energy LED giving a clear blue light. Preliminary work had led to the production of red and green LEDs. With blue, the three made white light. We all use LEDs as a matter of course now in our homes. They are cheaper, more energy-efficient and equally as bright as conventional bulbs. The latter are now being phased out completely by many governments with a view to conserving energy and fighting Climate Change.

Science by Number: Number 10, Neon.

Neon belongs to a group of gases called the Noble or Rare Gases. Chemically these gases are totally inert. Neon's abundance in the Universe is about 1 part in 750 making it fifth most abundant after Hydrogen. Helium, Oxygen and Carbon. It is rare in the Earth's atmosphere forming only 1 part in 55,000. Because of this it is costly to extract from air. 70% of the World's Neon is produced in Ukraine as a by-product of steel production in Russia. The current situation in Ukraine has forced the closure of two large plants producing the gas. A familiar use of Neon is in illuminated street signs. When electricity is passed though a sealed tube containing the gas, a vivid red/orange glow is seen. There are two types of Neon signs, one using small bulbs as in, for example, a radio set, the other the modern Neon tubes observed in illuminations. The first type has now been replaced by an equivalent using red LEDs.
