Strensall and Huntington WI Ramble - Monday 5th June 2023. Meet at 10 am in Strensall Village Hall for this walk of approximately 5 miles. Please note there are toilet facilities available in the village hall but not on the walk. Dogs on leads are welcome but are not allowed in the village hall. The ramble includes (paths and weather permitting) a walk along the River Foss, a tarmac path alongside the railway, woodland, Strensall common heathland, and a return through woods. The terrain is flat, with no stiles, but there may be narrow, muddy and uneven paths through woodland and heathland areas, other parts are tarmac or boarded walkways. Sheep and lambs roam the common and with luck we may see deer, squirrels, lizards or adders! Strensall Common is a site of Special Scientific Interest due its diversity of rare plants; the spring flora should be blooming and insects buzzing (insect repellent is recommended). We may hear cuckoos, if they are still around, spring bird song, gun shots from the training soldiers or expletives from frustrated golfers! It is a walk full of interest. Precision Breeding in Agriculture plus a breakthrough in Cancer Treatment

The Precision Breeding Bill has now passed through its 3 readings in the Houses of Commons and Lords and now awaits further scientific scrutiny and finally Royal Assent before it can be put into practice in the Agricultural industry in the UK.

Precision Breeding (PB) differs from Genetic Modification (GM). In the case of the former (PB), changes are made in the DNA sequence of a plant or animal organism which could have occurred naturally during the traditional breeding methods employed in farming. It resembles a process of Natural Selection as in Darwin's famous theory.

In the case of a GM organism, genetic material is removed from an unrelated species, something which would never occur in practice, and placed in the selected organism in a non-targeted way. In PB foods, the genetic material is very precisely targeted to enter a piece of DNA at one point and no other. The point is, PB could happen by chance as it only involves the organism's own DNA; GM could never do so. Robust risk assessments will be in place before PB foods are permitted in the UK food chain.

The Food Standards Agency (FSA) gives an assurance of this. Three criteria must be satisfied: The food must not present a risk to health; It must not mislead customers; It must not disadvantage them nutritionally. Precision Breeding applies to both animals and plants – this was accepted in the reading of the bill when its amendments were under consideration. Food plants such as cereal crops would be affected here.

By 2050, the world's population is projected to reach 9.8 billion. In countries that suffer prolonged famine during climate related disasters, PB could mean the difference between life and death. A similar technique has recently been successfully used in treating a patient with cancer by precisely targeting the cancer cells. Part of the patient's own genetic make-up called messenger RNA (Ribonucleic Acid) is used to attack the cancer cells in the patient's body. The messenger RNA immediately begins stimulating the patient's own immune system to kill the cancer cells.

The A to Z of Climate Change: "O" is for Oceans

The planet's oceans help in the fight against Climate Change. They are a powerful carbon sink absorbing one quarter of the total CO2 produced since we humans began burning fossil fuels. They are also an enormous heat trap, keeping the Planet's temperature below a critical level and, so far, have absorbed 90% of the heat generated by greenhouse gases produced since the industrial revolution. However, this has cost the oceans dearly. They are now starting to warm up to a temperature which is unsustainably above that in which some marine life can live. The oceans are losing oxygen, the gas which sustains all living creatures (plant or animal) The water is becoming more acidic with the dissolution of carbon dioxide (carbonic acid) and nitrous oxide (nitrous and nitric acids). Loss of surface water by evaporation is causing the oceans to become more saline, not the correct environment for some marine fauna. Delicate marine ecosystems are unable to survive, including the exquisite coral reefs that in turn support a multitude of marine fauna. As they tend towards a higher temperature, become more acidic and more saline, the oceans themselves have become a victim of climate change. What can we do to restore them to health? COP 26 and COP 27 missed a valuable opportunity to urge counterparts on the world stage to help prevent further damage. This was yet another of their missed opportunities. Our oceans must remain healthy in order that they can do their job as before and keep our planet and its remarkable biodiversity and variety of ecosystems healthy. Individually, we can do little. However, together we can move mountains. It is essential that world governments, beginning now, prepare for the next summit, COP 28, in Dubai so that constructive discourse can be held and no time is lost. The oceans are a living, breathing tool. Our collective vote can be brought to bear such that this tool is well used. The oceans should be flagged up high on the list of discussion areas so that they can be treated with respect. Humans were able to evolve on planet Earth because of its atmosphere and water content. Meanwhile, scientists send probes to space in search of water-containing planets whilst our planet pivots dangerously close to its Tipping point. This is an anachronism. It is perhaps time to lay it to rest.
