Doris Wilkinson Bursary 2022/2023 - Report and thank you from Monica Long

What on earth can we have for dinner tonight? Is this a moan expressed by you? It certainly is in my house! So, when I was fortunate enough to be awarded a Doris Wilkinson Bursary at the Autumn Council Meeting back in October, I decided to choose a cookery course. Not because I cannot cook (I have been cooking every day of every week of every month for the last 57+ years) but because I wanted to learn something different to cook.

I chose a Middle Eastern Cookery Course mainly because my favourite chef is Yotam Ottolenghi (and because I love chickpeas!!) I went to The Swinton Cookery School at the Swinton Park Estate and had a brilliant time (but no chickpeas were involved!). Four eager trainees learned to cook Iman Bayeldi (a delicious stuffed aubergine), Persian Lamb which was served with Herb Spiced Couscous and a pureed aubergine. We made our own Lebanese flat bread to accompany this and an Orange Olive Oil Cake to follow. We also found time to make Baklava which was so delicious.

A huge THANK YOU to WI for allowing me this experience and I urge all of you to apply for a bursary as you never know – someone has to be lucky!

EVENTS REPORTS

Introduction to Crewelwork – 26th June and 3rd July.

Eight members attended the two-day workshop at WI House and were keen to learn about crewel work. There was a choice of two designs based on original Jacobean patterns. The first task was to wrap the embroidery frame in cotton tape so that a firmer grip of the linen could be achieved. Then the linen twill was mounted on the frames. The tutor Jacqueline Schultz (*pictured far left*) carefully guided the group, demonstrating how to transfer the design using the technique of Prick and Pounce. Then on to the embroidery stitches which Jacqueline demonstrated skilfully. The concentration was so intense that at times all that could be heard was the drawing of the thread through



the linen. Such focussed attention led to some excellent embroidery with everyone achieving some very beautiful work. When finished, the embroidered panels can be incorporated into soft furnishings, mounted onto bags or cushions etc. A very enjoyable two days and lots learned.

August is a relatively quiet month. Here in Thorpe Willoughby the Yorkshire flag is hoisted on the village green.



This year's resolution, promoting clean rivers for people and wildlife, is discussed in the July-August WI Life, at page 21. This would be a good time to prepare for the Week of River Action, between 11th and 18th September - part of raising the alarm (more loudly, perhaps) about the country's pollution crisis. Possible practical measures, in action plans, will be suggested soon, and can be found, for example, in the Surfers Against Sewage campaign materials.

Plans are underway for a local presentation on the subject in March 2024 - with a focus on things we can ourselves do. As residents of North Yorkshire, we have the good fortune, and responsibility, of 8 neighbouring rivers.

The runner-up resolution (at 25,164 votes compared to 36,736) covered action against online gambling harms. The importance of offering treatment for gambling addiction was highlighted by the recent NHS announcement that in response to the rise in people seeking help 7 new facilities are to be opened, to bring the total across the country to 15, including 2 in Leeds and Sheffield. The NHS Chief Executive Amanda Pritchard has echoed many in bemoaning the sheer ease of online gambling, at the touch of a smartphone button.

Government proposals are still at White Paper stage and include a levy to be imposed on gambling companies the proceeds of which would be put towards treatment facilities, and a limit of £2 for stakes bought by young gamblers. Nothing is said (so far) about curbs on advertising. I know there is concern

among our members, with the potential there is for damage to the lives of gamblers, their families and their friends. There is no ready solution to the stigma. But assistance and advice can be sought from the National Gambling Support Network, with its GambleAware website and its helpline: is this an issue for your members?

The A to Z of Climate Change: U is for UNFCCC.

The United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) was the forerunner of all the world summits meeting to discuss the state of Climate Change progress at any particular time. We are all familiar with the Cop (Conference of Parties) meetings held once a year. The first of these, Cop 1 sets out the basic legal framework and principles for international climate change cooperation with the aim of stabilizing atmospheric concentrations of greenhouse gases (GHGs) to avoid "dangerous anthropogenic interference with the climate system." To boost the effectiveness of the 1992 UNFCCC, the Kyoto Protocol was adopted in December 1997. It committed industrialized countries and countries in transition to a market economy to achieve quantified emissions reduction targets for a "basket" of six GHGs. The Kyoto Protocol's first commitment period took place from 2008 to 2012. The 2012 Doha Amendment established the second commitment period from 2013 to 2020. In December 2015, parties adopted the Paris Agreement, which requires all parties to determine, plan, and regularly report on the nationally determined contribution (NDC) that it undertakes to mitigate climate change. Parties also submit aggregate progress on mitigation, adaptation, and means of implementation, which are reviewed every five years through a Global Stocktake. This year Cop 27 took place in Egypt and next year Cop 28 will take place in Dubai. All this shows clearly the pivotal role played by UNFCCC.

Science by Number: Number 18: Argon. Argon is a colourless, odourless, tasteless gas. It is one of a small number of chemical elements with similar characteristics, all of which are extremely unreactive chemically. Its name is derived from the Greek word meaning "lazy" or "inactive". This stability arises because of the electronic structure within the atom of the element which makes it intrinsically stable with no requirement to seek further stability by reaction with other elements. Argon is known as a noble gas and has other counterparts in the atmosphere. These are: Helium (first discovered on the sun), Neon, Krypton, Xenon and Radon (radioactive). Argon is the third most abundant gas in the Earth's atmosphere: twice as abundant as water vapour, 23 times as carbon dioxide (but not a greenhouse gas) and 500 times as neon. Because of its relative abundance and unreactivity chemically, Argon is extracted from liquid air and used whenever an inert atmosphere is necessary for a particular process. Some welding procedures are done at temperatures which render normally unreactive materials reactive. For example, some graphite electric furnaces use an argon atmosphere to prevent the graphite burning. Argon is used in incandescent lighting and in other types of gas discharge tubes. Thus, of all the Noble gases, Argon is the most useful and by far the cheapest. It is easily obtained from liquid air. Its ability to conduct heat is poor and its electronic conformation makes it suitable for use in various types of discharge tubes.
