This is a wonderful opportunity not only to represent your WI and the WIs in your Link, but also to meet fellow members from around the UK and is an experience not to be missed!



One thing that springs to mind in connection with September is harvest. This derives from an Old English word for autumn. Most of the month counts as late summer, though, building towards autumn: one of the markers for which is Michaelmas, on the 29th, at least in the past an occasion to feast on geese.

Harvest Festival this year does not take place till 4th October. But the theme is recognisable in this month's designation as Organic September. This offers an opportunity to celebrate pesticide-free produce and its

farmers and agents. Many of our fruit and vegetables are anyway at their best at this time of year, of course, to our great benefit.

Meanwhile work proceeds on the programme for 2024, on the horizon past winter.

The A to Z of Climate Change: V is for Vulnerability.

Climate vulnerability is a concept which describes how well people or other ecosystems adapt to changing climate. There are broadly two types of climate vulnerability (or risk) which overlap: economic and geographic. What this means is that the poorer people in the world are more vulnerable to the effects of climate change than the rich. Poorer communities include indigenous people, women, children, the elderly, and those on low incomes. Also, those in certain occupations are more vulnerable or at risk than others, for example smallholder farmers and fishing communities who are dependent upon the sustainability or otherwise of ocean use and effect of heating up of oceans and land use leading to extreme dryness and desertification. These two factors drive climate vulnerability. It also means that people living in areas of the world susceptible to flooding, drought, wildfires, heating of oceans which in turn drive our weather systems (at present the system, el Nino in the Pacific Ocean, is affecting global temperatures), which move around the world are at high risk of the effects of climate change. It has been estimated (2021) that 3.3 to 3.6 billion (current world population is 8 billion (estimate)) people are living in contexts of climate vulnerability. Hot off the Press: The average temperature of the world's oceans is rising at an unprecedented rate, Ocean temperature is now higher than that set in 2016. Does this point to a time for less talking by nations of the world and clearly to a time for action?

Science by Number: Number 19: Potassium.

Potassium is an alkali metal (the opposite of acid), silvery grey in colour and is soft enough to be cut with a knife. and is explosively reactive in air. Because the element is so reactive, it is stored under oil. It reacts vigorously with water and the vapour given off by the burning metal is a magenta (violet) colour. Most potassium compounds with other materials are non-toxic but where they are toxic it is because of the materials with which the potassium is chemically combined. Potassium chlorate and potassium nitrate are both used in explosives. Potassium is very important in living organisms, in fact it is the ratio of potassium to a similar metal, sodium, that matters. Because potassium is so important to living organisms, potassium sulphate is used in fertilisers which helps keep some staple foods relatively high in potassium. Its chief function is in maintaining the action of muscles in the body., enabling them to contract or expand. Its' action depends on the ratio of potassium to sodium (a similar metal) The heart is a pump and is made of muscle. Thus, potassium is important in the function of the heart, pushing blood through the arteries and veins. Good food sources of potassium are bananas, apricots and raisins. Only tiny quantities of these "trace metals" are required. In general, a normal diet provides all the average individual needs.

Instead of their August meeting, **Thirsk & Carlton Miniott W.I.** visited Dunesford Vineyard, near Boroughbridge, for a wine tasting experience, which even the showery weather couldn't dampen. We learnt about grape varieties suitable for

cooler climates and the pruning and maintenance necessary to ensure a good crop of grapes; work often carried out by a team of volunteers, who regularly help out. Entering the Cellar Bar, one is immediately struck by the amazing murals by Leyburn artist, Lynn Ward, and it seemed



as though we were entering an ancient wine cellar. Upstairs is an incredibly detailed mural, 27ft in length depicting the nearby village of Aldborough surrounded by its vineyards at the peak of the Roman occupation. Wine production in England is nothing new.

The actual wine tasting didn't disappoint either and we learned how to tell which sort of wine we enjoyed: aroma, flavour and the feel of the wine inside your mouth all play a part, giving us a reference for choosing a wine in the future. This was followed by a cheese and charcuterie platter, accompanied of course by a range of Dunesford wines.

Romanby WI turns 95 - Formed in 1928 Romanby WI celebrated its 95th Anniversary with a party for members and two guests from Federation. Members were invited to dress in 1920s fashions for the occasion, and the hall was decorated in black and gold paper chains, fans, and banners. During the event the names of the founding committee members were read aloud, and photo albums of past members and events were displayed. The first ever general meeting of Romanby WI was on 23rd October 1928 at the Dairy Institute, no longer standing, 56 members
