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MEMBERSHIP FEES 2024/2025

An email regarding the **Subscription 2024/2025** has been sent out to all WIs as part of the NFWI November 2023 Mailing. The NFWI Board of Trustees has set the membership subscription for the 2024/2025 membership year at £48.00. This means there will be a £2.00 increase from the current membership year. The distribution of the 2024/2025 subscription will be:

Pro-rata subscription for new members in their first year - New members joining the WI from April 2024 for the first time, or who have not been members of any WI in the past year, will pay a pro-rata subscription depending on the quarter in which they join. The rate per quarter and the distribution are shown in the table below:

New WIs starting in 2024/2025 - New WIs starting from April 2024 will keep all the subscriptions paid by their members in 2024/2025 membership year.

Flexibility Policy - WIs can apply the flexibility policy to their 2024/2025 subscription. This means they can charge the full amount of the WI portion of the subscription, reduce their portion of the subscription or waive the WI portion of the subscription entirely.

Dual Membership - Dual members will pay the WI portion only to their second WI. If the WI is not utilising the flexibility policy, this will be £23.60. There is no pro-rata rate for dual membership, and the set fee will remain payable at any time during the year.

Pooling of Fares 2024 - The NFWI Annual Meeting pooling of fares for 2024 is set at £16.00 per WI.

* **INSURANCE 2023 / 2024** - The Public Liability Certificate is enclosed, should your WI need it.

* Enclosed is the **MEMBERSHIP FEES FORM PART 4** for the final quarter of 2023/2024. Please pass to your WI Treasurer to be completed and sent back to WI House by the deadline mentioned on the form, even if it is a Nil Return.

In the New Year, we will be sending the Full Membership Fees Return for the year 2024/2025. As our Federation Treasurer explained at the Autumn Council Meeting, we are under pressure from National to return the National portion before the end of April 2024. This we know put a lot of pressure on you as members and your Treasurer, but this is at the request of National, not our Federation. It would be much appreciated if the fees for the Full Membership are returned promptly as we, at Federation level, will be under pressure from National.

HEALTH SCREENING OPPORTUNITY - WEDNESDAY 6 MARCH 2024, WI HOUSE, THIRSK, YO7 1BG.

The Osteoporosis Assessment Service is a mobile health screening company specialising in offering lowcost health assessments. They are offering for a **special fee of £25.00** an Ultrasound Bone Density Heel Scan which assesses the Osteoporosis Fracture Risk. The machine used to perform the test is a heel ultrasound scanner (McCue CUBAClinical) which does not use X-rays but safe ultrasound signals. The bone density measured in the heel is strongly related to the hip and spine and is an excellent scanning site for osteoporosis assessments. A small amount of ultrasound gel is placed on a bare heel and the scan is performed within three minutes. The results are printed and explained to each client at the time of their consultation.

Risk factors : Family history of Osteoporosis (Mother, Grandmother); Low Calcium intake ; Regular Steroid use; Lack of exercise; Smoking; Excessive Dieting (anorexia); Overactive Thyroid Gland; Hysterectomy with ovaries removed; Previous Fracture (from a low impact fall); Early Menopause or Post-menopausal and not on HRT.

Sashiko hand stitching workshop – Nine members joined Helen Barnes to learn the art of Japanese Sashiko Embroidery at WI House. She explained that Sashiko means small stitches, these were used to hold together layers

of fabric that needed to be mended and strengthened. It is unique to Japan. Cotton was mainly used due to the low social status of the communities and sumptuary laws, but hemp was also popular. The sumptuary laws also forbid bright colours and any stitching bigger

than a grain of rice, hence the size of the stitches.

From this one small stitch, comes an array of geometric patterns in white on an indigo background. The designs are motifs inspired from nature, the environment and stylized objects. These motifs are repetitive and based on a grid of vertical, horizontal and diagonal lines. The patterns were handed down from mother to daughter as a story is passed from



one generation to the next since ancient times. In the 19th Century it began to be sewn by the merchant classes for its decorative value.

On 18th October, 7 lucky members attended the Lampshade making Workshop run by Claire Priestley from Teesside Felts. We were met with a lovely array of felted lamps and items made by Claire to look at and see what could be achieved using fibre before we started.



After Claire explained about the fibre and how to pull and lay it out to create a scene, we all started to plan what we wanted to create. Some ladies already knew what they wanted or had a certain colour way they wanted to do. In the end we all did either a landscape or seascape design, I created a poppy field design.

Claire also showed some of us how to make mini wet felted flowers that we planned to add when our fabric was dry to create a 3d effect.

After lunch we all started to wet felt our main design using soap and water to start the fulling process. It was fascinating seeing the pattern appear once it was all wet and the fluff had disappeared.

When we had finished gluing on our fabric to the lampshade it was time for the big reveal. Seeing the lamps all light up made the hard work come to life. Everyone did an amazing job and were over the moon with how they turned out. It was wonderful to see how different they all looked. So the 12 days of Christmas are back on the horizon. Amongst all the preparations, do find time to book for our spring events: the first is lunch with Zoe Metcalfe, our Police and Crime Commissioner, at The Downe Arms in Wykeham on 2nd March - a fascinating talk and delicious food, something to look forward to after the gloom of January!

The new Safeguarding policy, mentioned in the October Newsletter, has now been circulated to all WIs for your consideration.

Your New Year's resolutions will have their turn. Right now, it's time to consider our four:

- Dental Health Matters

There is a chronic shortage of NHS Dentists and people are suffering health issues as a result. The NFWI calls on the Government to increase investment in the training and retention of dentists and to review the current inadequate NHS contracts in order to ensure everyone can access an NHS dentist wherever they live.

Impacts of poor housing conditions

Poor housing can have a deleterious effect on human health and wellbeing, safety and quality of life and can disproportionately affect the most vulnerable groups in society.

The NFWI calls on the UK Government to boost housing standards and regulations, increase funding for housing renovations, increase the supply of affordable and secure housing and strengthen collaboration with local authorities, housing associations and other relevant stakeholders to develop strategies that address local housing challenges.

Say 'no' to gambling advertising

Harm caused by excessive gambling is a global problem. Some countries are already addressing this by banning advertising. The NFWI calls on members, the government, regulators, the NHS, educationalists and gambling charities to work together towards achieving a complete ban on gambling advertising. This will reduce gambling harm, save the NHS money, protect family relationships and decrease the number of suicides, around 400 per annum at present.

- Improving Outcomes for Women in the Criminal Justice System

There is an urgent need to radically reform decision making in respect of women in the criminal justice system and in particular, pregnant women and women with children. We urge cross government collaboration to the deliver on the 2018 female offender strategy by setting goals, robust governance and performance measures to reduce the number of women who have committed non-violent offences from being imprisoned.

Science - I became a member of the Executive committee of NYEFWI in 2008 and simultaneously was elevated to the position of Federation Science Co-ordinator serving on the then PA&I committee (later the Current Affairs committee). I was the first to occupy this vacancy which had up to that time never had a previous occupant. That was a good state of affairs as I had no-one to keep up with so far as excellence mattered. Being trained in science, it was like fitting a square peg into a square hole. I loved the job and took to my new role like a duck to water. I took my followers to various seats of excellence like Oxbridge, Jodrell Bank, Bletchley Park and many others. There was always a meal to keep us on our toes and tea and biscuits along the way. (after all, we were the WI). We had lots of excellent speakers for evening events; members specially liked our forensic guest speakers (forensic science, archaeology and art were firm favourites). Another talk was at the Belmont room in York and we listened to speakers on Functional food as we sampled tempting morsels from Betty's own incomparable kitchens. Another popular talk, the Science of the Cream Tea, was held many times in the conservatory at Scampston Walled Garden. I could go on, but I desist. Those who came will, I hope, always remember.

Non-scientists (yes we have them in NYEFWI!) presumably did other things. If I inspired one member with a love of "the life scientific" (to coin a phrase) I retire happy. I have been happy to dedicate my Federation life as a member to serving you the members in my own way.

Now it can understand not just the words we are expressing but also the context. Making it feel like we are engaging with a real person, although one who is highly informed.

For the interest of members, I provide the link to ChatGPT below. Here you can sign up for a free account. It is free because it is not the newest version, (although still quite astonishing to use).

I have no affiliation with the ChatGPT, but as I work in digital, I keep abreast of new technologies. As natural language is underpinning much of the automation coming into the customer services, it is useful to understand it a bit more.

As a starting point you might want to ask it too, "Write me a letter of gratitude to my friend in less than 250 words, mentioning how kind, funny and loyal they are." Or perhaps ask it to write you a poem as I did for the July newsletter. That one was generated by asking it to "write a four verse poem about the women's institute, with a focus on friendship." If you aren't happy with the letter or poem you can ask, "please write me another," and it will. **Kate Stead - Kirby Sigston WI**
