Silver Stacking Rings Workshop, Friday 26th July, 10.00 am to 1.00 pm, WI House, Thirsk, YO7 1BG.

Why not join us to make Silver Stacking Rings. Helen Drye will teach you to make two sterling silver stacking rings using traditional silversmithing skills. You will make two narrow band rings. These can be stacked together or used with other rings. You will size, form, saw and shape your rings. Then you will solder your rings and decorate them with a unique texture. You will be able to take the rings home at the end of the session.

Learn to paint in Gouache with Alison Southward, Saturday 14th September, 10.00am to 3.30pm, WI House, Thirsk. Gouache is often known as opaque watercolour, in that it paints in a similar way but has a different finish. Gouache dries matte and with an almost velvety look, ideal for cottages and harbour scenes. Six Reasons to give Gouache a go!

1. Gouache combines the best traits of all other paint mediums

2. Gouache is very versatile, use it thickly, build up layers or dilute more

and paint a semi-transparent wash

3. Gouache is a very forgiving and easy to work with medium for a beginner

4. Gouache comes in a range of colours: bright and bold or pastel and even metallic

5. Gouache can be used on many different surfaces

6. Gouache photographs and scans well and because of this, has a history in illustration and advertising.

Willow Lantern Building Workshop, Monday 30th September, WI House, 9.30am - 4.30pm.

Learn the basic skills and forms of lantern building, and all about the properties of willow and paper. Produce a beautiful "Seed-pod" inspired lantern which will incorporate battery powered LED lighting, suitable for indoor or outdoor use. It will be a busy day building a striking and sculptural lantern. You will take home a completed lantern form ready to

surface decorate with your unique personal design in your own time at home if desired. The coloured translucent paper to achieve this is supplied. There will be some working in pairs and quite a bit of time standing. You will need to bring the following:-

- A pair of sharp secateurs/snips, pliers if you have a preferred pair.
- Apron, overall or clothes you don't mind getting non-washable PVA glue on.
- A packed lunch.
- Polythene protection for car seats as there is a possibility that lanterns may not be completely dry by the end of the day. A couple of opened up black bin liners should do the trick.

Teddy bear making workshop - Janet Wilson, Scarborough Sea Gals



Seven of us gathered at the Federation office in Thirsk in February to attend a two-day workshop to make a teddy bear. I had never made a jointed animal of any kind before so it was a new experience for me. On day one we cut out the bear from mohair material and the pads for the paws from ultra suede. Our task then was to sew together the body, head and limbs of the bear using backstitch. This was very time consuming and Jacqueline, the tutor kept us moving demonstrating how the head, limbs and paws were sown together. This was so that we could complete each part during the week ready to assemble the bear in week two.

The following week we all arrived with most of us having managed to complete our homework of sewing the separate parts. A major part of the day was stuffing and creating the head. We had to stuff the nose very firmly and find the correct position for the eyes and ears so the bear looked balanced and not lopsided. We then embroidered on the nose and it was amazing how much character they then had, and all very individual. We had been asked to bring long nosed pliers and Jacqueline demonstrated how to insert the disks and pins into the bear parts to form the joints. It was lovely to see how the bear came together and we were all very pleased with our efforts. Jacqueline as tutor was very clear in her demonstrations and explanations so it was a very pleasant and successful workshop.

This is a month of character: starting as it does with April Fools Day. This is an ancient and international tradition. The first recorded British prank took several people to the

Tower of London to wash the lions, in 1698.

Then it's 76 years since the creation of the World Health Organisation (remembered with World Health Day on the 7th), 75 since 12 nations formed NATO (4th April 1949) and 50 since ABBA deservedly won the Eurovision Song Contest with "Waterloo" (6th April 1974)!

National Tea Day falls on the 21st, and England's patron saint St George (a soldier born in Cappadocia, Turkey, in the 3rd century) is commemorated on the 23rd.

There's of course the Spring Council Meeting in Scarborough for many of you to enjoy before that.

After that, plans are underway for a possible Gambling Awareness event in York in September.

NFWI 2024 RESOLUTION – Stop Press: Dental Health Matters will be the one resolution to be voted on at the Annual Meeting on 5th June. It secured 37,772 votes, 39.6% of the 95,406 cast (by not far off half of the national membership). The other results were as follows: Impacts of Poor Housing Conditions 27,608 or 28.9%, Say No to Gambling Advertising 20,077 or 21%, and Improving outcomes for women in the criminal justice system 9,949 or 10.4%. This all mirrors our own results closely.

The wording of the resolution is as follows: Dental Health Matters – *There is a chronic shortage of NHS Dentists and people are suffering health issues as a result. The NFWI calls on the Government to increase investment in the training and retention of dentists and to review the current inadequate NHS contracts in order to ensure everyone can access an NHS dentist wherever they live.*

Next steps - voting:

WIs should now consider how they wish their delegate to vote on the resolution at the NFWI Annual Meeting on 5th June. All WIs get one vote on the resolution – for or against. WIs are also encouraged to hold discussion events to allow members to consider how they wish their delegate to vote. The NFWI will also be hosting a discussion event. Please see below for further details.

WIs may choose to give their link delegate discretion to decide how to vote after hearing the speakers and the debate at the Annual Meeting. Please ensure your WI makes it clear to the Office when casting your vote whether you are granting your Link Delegate discretion.

Federation Representatives and link delegates attending in-person will cast physical paper votes during the voting session. Federation Representatives and link delegates attending virtually will cast electronic votes via Electionbuddy during the voting session. Both physical voting papers and electronic voting links will be shared with Federation Representatives and link delegates in advance of the meeting. No votes may be cast before or after the meeting.

You will now find a selection of resources to help you learn more about the resolution on My WI:

- Detailed briefing notes about the resolution
- A PowerPoint presentation on the topic
- A quiz to test your knowledge
- A Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) document about the resolutions process
- A discussion guide with ideas about how to discuss the resolution in your WI

To support members in learning more about the resolution that will be voted upon at the Annual Meeting, the **NFWI will be hosting a webinar on Wednesday 24 April at 12noon**. The webinar will be an

opportunity to learn more about the topic and will be open to all members to attend. **Members who wish to join can register their interest** <u>via MyWI.</u> Please note that arguments for and against the resolution will not be presented at this supplementary meeting, and no voting will take place. Details on how to join the event will be shared with registered attendees closer to the time, and a recording of the event will be available on My WI shortly after the event for members to access.

To conclude with a renewed question: "Could you help out with our Federation climate campaigns, informally or in the role of a Climate Ambassador and in any case as part of our team?" If you feel this could be something you would like to explore please get in touch.
