**Visit to North Yorkshire County Records** - Far from being a dry, starchy topic, this visit proved fascinating. We were welcomed with a cup of coffee and biscuits and were then taken on a tour of the archive. It is immense – and with the expert guidance from our hosts we were able to appreciate this great resource. One fascinating map c.1747 showed Whitby Harbour's preparations for possible attack from the French – it even had tiny drawings of sailing ships and the Abbey on the headland. A really interesting visit and the place to follow up research into people and houses, plus lots more.

Springtime at last, and the Chelsea Flower Show! The month opens, charmingly, with International Dawn Chorus Day; then with local elections on the 2nd, this time for a Mayor. Recognition of a problem affecting many of us comes in Deaf Awareness Week, 1st-7th.

May boasts 2 bank holidays, and also National Doughnut Week from 18th to 26th - not as frivolous as it sounds, but to support The Children's Trust.

WIs will be finalising votes for or against the Dental Health Matters resolution, for next month's Annual Meeting.

NFWI has just established a project encouraging people to speak up about climate change. It has a partner organisation called Larger Us which held an online introduction in April to inform (or remind) us of the importance and impact of conversations on the subject, and training will be offered in May, followed by a Challenge in June. Details available from publicaffairs@nfwi.org.uk. It does sound a very good idea.

#### **REPORT – CLEAN WATER CONFERENCE**

**On 2<sup>nd</sup> March fifty WI members attended a Clean Water Conference** organised by the Coast and Valley group to raise awareness. Cathy Fairley introduced Sir Robert Goodwill MP, Chris Watt representing the Yorkshire Wildlife Trust, Alex Cripps who oversees the rivers team at NY National Park, James Copeland the senior environment and land use advisor from the NFU, Alex Reardon who is head of a new department for river health and Yorkshire Water and Steve Crawford for Surfers Against Sewage. Each speaker explained the challenges and the hard work that is ongoing in an attempt to achieve clean rivers and seas that are safe for wildlife, safe for us to swim in and for all to enjoy.

They all agreed that some progress has been made but for this huge change to be achieved much more investment is needed along with reliable infrastructure, more testing, accountability and law enforcement. Steve Crawford illustrated the sorry state of the sea when he put on his Neptune's cloak, a dreadful sight, adorned in appalling items found in the sea. This was followed by a very lively question and answer session.



Gambling dangers and what we can do - Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> September from 1 to 4 pm at Clements Hall, Nunthorpe Road, York YO23 1BW. Come along to this session (walking distance from the station) to hear about the risks of gambling and the power of advertising, and to discuss steps we can take to help action against the harm caused and for restrictions on advertising. [These are topics about which WI members have demonstrated significant concern over the past couple of years]: with some 1.4 million people addicted, the activity being a factor in between 117 and 496

suicides per year, and 11,000 gambling messages sent in the opening weekend of the 2023/24 Premier League football season.

The session will be led by Liz Ritchie MBE co-founder of the charity *Gambling with Lives*, who lost her son to the addiction, and William Prochaska, who has worked with Gambling with Lives and is now an independent advisor and the leader of the Coalition against Gambling Ads. Lunch will be provided - soup, baked potatoes, tea, coffee, biscuits; Friends and family will be welcome too. Cost: £16.00. Booking from 7<sup>th</sup> May. Closing date: 20<sup>th</sup> August. ## **AROUND OUR FEDERATION**




Ainderby Steeple WI's last meeting was an enjoyable games evening



On 27<sup>th</sup> March, eighteen members from **Dunnington WI** visited the Battle of Stamford Bridge Tapestry. The afternoon started well with tea and cake (well up to WI standards).

Duly refreshed, we had a presentation from local historian Brian, who gave us a synopsis of the political make-up of 11<sup>th</sup>C England and identified the major players in contention for the crown. He went on to describe the events leading up to the battle, the battle

Ann, one of the 25 stitchers who worked on the tapestry, followed Brian with the history of how the project was conceived, designed and executed using authentic colours and stitches in keeping with the Bayeux tapestry.
