So, we're now in the month that commemorates Julius Caesar, Roman dictator from 49 to 44 BC, assassinated by fellow senator Brutus and others on 15th March, the Ides of March as famously portrayed by Shakespeare. At the NFWI Annual Meeting on 5th June, Delegates voted on the Resolution "Dental Health Matters" after listening to speakers for and against. The result was a resounding 95.53 percent in favour.

This year's Fourth of July will be remembered in this country for the general election.

Other notable events include Disability Pride month, a positive import from the USA since 2015; the Great British Pea Week from the 1st to the 7th; and the 70th anniversaries of the end of rationing and the start of BBC television news broadcasts on 4th and 5th July 1954.

Wimbledon tennis occupies the first 2 weeks. Then the Paris Olympics (the 33rd Olympiad) begin on the 26th and continue till 11th August: 10,500 athletes in 32 sports, including new ones, breakdancing, surfing, skateboarding and sport climbing, but not karate, which has made just the one appearance, last time in Tokyo.

A fine piece of English folklore for 15th July: if it rains on St Swithin's Day it will rain for the next 40 days, and if dry it will be dry for the next 40 days. This saint was Bishop of Winchester between 852 and 863; I seem to recall that at school (he was the patron) we felt this would be rather unsporting.

Whatever the weather, we wish everyone a pleasant summer! There are Federation events to look forward to in the autumn.

Science Suggestions - Pollinators

A pollinator is anything which helps carry pollen from one flower to another. The movement of pollen must occur for a plant to become fertilized and produce fruit, seeds, and young plants. Birds, bats, butterflies, moths, flies, beetles, wasps small mammals and most importantly bees are all pollinators. Without pollination we would eventually lose all our plants - not only flowers - but also all of our plant food and fruit. All of these creatures visit flowers to drink the pollen and transport pollen grains as they move from flower to flower. The wind can also play a part in pollination, as can the serious gardener who can be seen in their greenhouse with a little paintbrush disturbing the pollen from one plant to another. There are many different bees. We think of Honeybees and Bumble Bees, but there are a variety of bees around the world doing the same job. Bees are on the decline. A virus is killing many of our bees, but this is made worse by our use of different insecticides.



To encourage all insects, especially bees, into our garden we should plant flowers with open faces, like daisies, apple blossom etc., that offer easy access to the precious pollen. Some bees like the tubular flower, like foxgloves, where they can reach down into the middle of the flower. Bees also seem to like yellow flowers. We can also help by not using insecticides. Another great help is not to have a too tidy garden. Leave areas a bit on the wild side, to encourage all sorts into your garden. Then just sit and watch and be immersed by the sights and the sounds of nature.

Climate Concerns - It has been a strange year. A really mild winter followed by a warm early spring and then a very wet late spring. As I write, it is now the beginning of June and gardens are looking very lush with all the rain we have had, but it isn't warm enough for the early summer flowers to bloom. Is this what we are to expect, mild winters, an early spring and at this point we don't know what summer will be.

What can we do? We really must rely on the government to continue to tackle the issue on the world stage. We can save water in our gardens. We have 5 water butts, which goes a long way to water the garden without resorting to the hose pipe. Collected rainwater is free and better for our plants.

It has been suggested that if you have water butts, when they are full you disconnect the outlet pipe which goes into the drain. This can help to stop surges of rainwater being channelled into the sewers, which in turn causes overflow of sewage into our rivers. You can also use washing up water to water your plants. As always - every little helps.

WI MYTH BUSTERS – TRUE OR FALSE?

The WI Treasurer is responsible for the money held in the WI account?

FALSE - The committee and members are responsible for ensuring any monies held by a WI are spent according to the objects of the WI Constitution. The Committee as Trustees should oversee any spending for the running of a WI, consulting the members about any large purchases such as a projector, speaker system etc. The Treasurer should give the Committee an update on finances at each Committee meeting, the President should sign each bank statement. The Treasurer usually gives a brief update to members at a monthly meeting.

All the WI Officers can share their roles?

FALSE – As per the Constitution, the same person can combine the Secretary and Treasurer roles and the Treasurer and Vice-President roles only. This must be agreed by the Federation Board of Trustees and should only be seen as a short-term solution.

A WI cannot meet in a pub?

FALSE – Several WIs meet in pubs or clubs, in fact, the first WI in England met in a pub in East Sussex. A WI can meet in any venue that is accessible for their members and by meeting in the local pub can often be supporting that business with members purchasing refreshments.

BURSARY REPORT

I was very fortunate to win the Doris Wilkinson bursary this year. I used the bursary to go on a silver jewellery-making course at Higham Hall in the Lake District. Higham Hall is a lovely Grade II listed Manor House. It is situated between Cockermouth and Keswick very close to Bassenthwaite Lake. The ambience, the running of the hall and the excellent food was just like Denman College, so I immediately felt very much at home.

The course was held in an adjoining studio that had everything that we needed in order to make the jewellery. We arrived early Friday evening in time for the evening meal and then met our tutor Rebecca Halstead who demonstrated the various equipment that we would be using. There were 9 ladies on the course and although it was a beginner's course 4 were intermediates.

Saturday was Project One that was to make a round silver wire bangle with a saw pierced dangling charm. Plus, a sheet silver bangle that was held with a ring of silver wire.

Sunday was Project Two an unusual set of stacking rings 3 individual rings, one in plain wire, one in decorative wire and one with a large cabochon created from textured domed silver and oxidised and blackened.

Monday was the final morning we created a pair of simple drop earrings. I also made some small stud earrings from the pieces of silver we had left. Rebecca suggested that I make a small pendant from all the other bits of silver left over. I just put them together and soldered them and a ring was put on the top. I call it my Picasso piece!

It all looked rather daunting at the beginning, but we all learned how to saw, cut, bend, emboss, measure, file, solder and blacken silver.

I had a really great time and the group gelled very well - such fun. Rebecca was so patient and extremely helpful and I was delighted with my efforts! *Thank you - Angela Fawcett*
