He interviews people for the Mail on Sunday, writes for other titles including The Guardian, makes and presents award-winning documentaries for BBC Radio 4 and has just published his fifth book. Cole has interviewed some of the most famous and infamous people in the world, from Tiger Woods to the Archbishop of Canterbury.

# NFWI ANNUAL MEETING 2025 - IMPORTANT INFORMATION

The Meeting will be held online on Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> June. At the meeting, an important vote will be taken on the new Constitution, which has been several years in preparation, and will guide us through the next ten years or so.

We know that some WIs/groups of WIs will manage to get together a 'watch party' but please note that Link Delegates are required to attend all day online in order to cast votes.

Voting attendees (Federation Representatives and WI Link Delegates), will each require a WiFi-enabled device, i.e. a smart phone, iPad or laptop in order to vote on constitutional items during the meeting. All votes will be cast on Electionbuddy, a secure online voting platform. To ensure all constitutional requirements are met and to report the number of voters in attendance, every watch party that includes voting attendees must appoint a lead contact who will liaise with the NFWI on the morning of the event. To make things easier for Delegates and in the spirit of fellow members getting together, the Federation is aiming to organise a viewing at the Galtres Centre in Easingwold. The venue is accessible with parking and they have all the facilities, including good WiFi and internet coverage. This would enable all Delegates to attend in the same location. Observers would also be welcome to attend at a small cost. Further details

will follow.

Traditionally a grey month (although with Yorkshire Pudding Day on the 2nd). But many of us will be diligently putting our New Year's resolutions into practice. There's time also for the WI resolutions: your votes are due at WI House, by post or email, **before the deadline of 9th February.** 

By way of reminder: the choice is between these 4:

1) Let's talk about incontinence - the goal being to raise awareness and reduce the stigma, at a time when an estimated 20.5 million people in the UK are affected.

2) Bystanders can be lifesavers - helping to promote early CPR and the supply of more defibrillators; every year some 30,000 suffer cardiac arrest in the community and more than 1 in 10 will die, at present.
3) Join the repair revolution - encouraging repair and reuse of clothes, to combat the environmental

damage caused by the mountains' worth thrown away around the world.

4) Eliminate landfill of medication packaging: there's a need for more collection points, so this can go for recycling. **Votes to reach WI House by 9<sup>th</sup> February 2025.** 

Looking ahead, we have the **litter picking week from 24<sup>th</sup> March**, as part of the Great British Spring Clean – a creation of Keep Britain Tidy, which itself grew out of a WI campaign, 70 years ago. Come and join us on a **visit to Drax Power Station, Drax, Selby, North Yorkshire YO8 8PH, on Friday, 30<sup>th</sup> May from 10.00am to 12.00pm.** Drax power station is a large biomass power station providing enough electricity to power 4 million homes. You will gain a valuable insight into the energy generation process and how electricity is produced on a massive scale. You will also learn about Drax's social impact within local communities. The visit will include a presentation, a bus tour around the site and a guided walk into the heart of the station. The walk will include going up 90 steps so sturdy shoes and



comfortable clothing are required. You will need to bring photo ID with you on the day.

<u>Please note</u> that Drax Power Station has been trialing the use of peanut shell pellets, and whilst every effort is made to remove the nut content completely, some traces may remain – meaning there's a minimal risk of exposure if you're on site at the power station. **Cost: £5.00. **Northallerton WI** recently visited the Georgian Theatre in Richmond to Jessica Swales debut play about the first women students at Cambridge. The Blue Stockings.

A moving, comical and eye-opening story of four young women fighting for education and self-determination against the larger backdrop of women's suffrage in 1896. Girton College, Cambridge, the first college in Britain to admit women. The Girton girls study ferociously and match their male peers grade for grade. Yet, when the men graduate, the women leave with nothing but the stigma of being a "blue stocking"; - an unnatural, educated woman. They are denied degrees and go home unqualified and unmarriageable. We arrived at the Georgian Theatre as prepared as a troop of scouts armed

with our weapons of choice - teaspoons! for the interval ice creams.

Poppy's (obviously apocalypse prepper) had a quiet word and got her ice cream defrosted but poor Dawn was taken unawares and was still digging through hers at a glacial speed deep into the second curtain. Whilst purchasing the ice creams from hell, we viewed a picture of the Theatre Sponsor, Lady Crathorne, the offspring of the maker of our embroidered table mantle which has been passed to us to keep this heirloom in trust and maintain the bond of WI's in North Yorkshire.

**A Bit More History** - Sarah and I had the pleasure of attending the 100<sup>th</sup> celebration of Sessay WI on 4 December, a very joyous occasion where Sarah our Federation Chairman presented the 100<sup>th</sup> Certificates from both Federation and National. We enjoyed a delicious afternoon tea and entered the Christmas Spirit singing Carols. The following was read by Margaret May and I thought it was so interesting I asked for this to be forwarded so that you our fellow members could also appreciate the history of Sessay WI. – Shirley Nicholls – Finance Secretary

#### December 9<sup>TH</sup> 1924

Picture the scene, 34 ladies walk or cycle in the dark to Sessay School. There in the schoolroom, lit by oil lamps, they hear the Vicar's wife introduce the county organiser to explain the history and origins of the WI. After a short discussion, a vote was taken and it was carried unanimously that there should be a Women's Institute in Sessay, and here we are today 100 years later.

At the first meeting in January they had a Cake Icing demonstration, followed in February by one on Butter Making where in the absence of the President, her husband chaired the meeting!

By the first AGM held in December 1925 there were 41 members and thanks to 2 whist drives and a dance there was £13.4.3 in the bank.

July 1927 saw the first WI outing, a charabanc trip to Bridlington and in the following year 37 members set off at 8am to Whitby and didn't arrive home till 10pm!

July 1937 saw the 21<sup>st</sup> birthday party of the National WI.

*I wonder if any of you might have somewhere in your family treasures a copy of the recipe for the WI. Cocktail, consisting of cabbage water, nettle and mint! Don't worry we haven't made any for today! 1939 Sessay prepares to do its bit for the war effort.* 

October brought the opportunity to buy sugar in bulk for preserving.

12.5 cwt was ordered at £2.7s 6d per cwt. but owing to the budget by the time it was delivered the price was £3.7s.

There was no annual dance this year, just a whist drive. The members of the Sessay Searchlight Party were to be invited and to any other social activity free of charge.

The money raised from the whist drive, £2.15.0. was used to buy wool for knitting socks for the Army and Navy. It was turned into: 9 pairs of socks, 1 pullover, 10 pairs mittens,1 pair gloves, 5 scarves, 2 pairs wristlets and 1 helmet. In July another14 cwt of sugar was ordered. There must have been a lot of preserving pans being used in the village.

*In 1948 there was a rumour that electricity might come to Sessay so the WI Secretary wrote to the supply company in Newcastle to inquire.* 

May 1949 a large aluminium teapot was purchased for £1.10s. Could this be the one we still use?

December 1950 attendance was very poor, no one was prepared to stand for the committee (what's changed!), so it was decided to close the Institute, but January 1951 the close down was averted and new officers were appointed.

The letter to the electricity company must have worked because in June 1955 the proposed Calor Gas Demonstration was cancelled.

In 1958 the use of electricity was well established and demonstrations of Demas Electric Cookers, Hoovermatic Washing Machines, Electrolux Fridges, Kenwood Mixers and the use of Electric Grills were the subjects for monthly meetings.

February 1961 saw a member of the WI being elected to be a member of the newly formed Village Hall Committee.

Margaret Flintoff has appeared in the minutes for many years and is our longest serving member. In 1962 Anne Wady and Margaret Watkinson joined and in 1970 Brenda was welcomed as a visitor.

It was in October 1971 that it was proposed that until Christmas the meetings should be held in the new Village Hall, and we are still here!

In 1979 following a fire Mrs. Blakey submitted a resolution about flammable materials used in furnishings, but it was another 9 years before it was discussed by the government. Changes were made, new laws introduced and the use of flammable materials in furniture became illegal.

Many lives must have been saved as a result of Sessay's Resolution.

In April 1983 the first meeting of North Yorkshire East was held in Scarborough.

1984 we celebrated our 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary, planting the cherry tree outside the village hall.

At the AGM in 1986 a presentation was made to Watty who had been president for16 years and at the same meeting Brenda was appointed Treasurer, 38 years ago and she is still in the job!

*In 1993 bulbs were planted as a memorial garden to past members. During the recent renovations of the hall all the bulbs were dug up and replanted throughout the village.* 

The lifestyle of members may have changed drastically over the century, but we still have our monthly meetings, sing Jerusalem, enjoy talks and demonstrations, chatting together, sharing ideas and dreams, caring for each other and helping to support the village community.

*Those ideas explained to those 34 ladies in the schoolroom 100 years ago still hold true for us today. Thank you Sessay WI for a lovely afternoon.* 

**Ainderby Steeple WI** - At our meeting on 10th December Judith Brown our outgoing president presented us with a table runner created by our embroidery group. Inspired by Judith, Marjorie Chapman, Hilary Harries, Janet Hart, Vanessa Green, Jenny Wellens Hazel Cantle and Jackie Chard designed and embroidered the runner to commemorate the coronation of King Charles III. WI members before us had embroidered a tablecloth to commemorate the coronation of Queen



Elizabeth II and we wanted to follow in their footsteps. Our efforts were well rewarded by the friendships we made through the enterprise.

Choosing Jerusalem as the WI anthem came as a result of a letter to the former WI membership magazine "Home & Country" prior to the 8<sup>th</sup> Annual General Meeting in 1924. Grace Hadow, Vice-Chair at the time, suggested its use after attending *"exhibitions or council meetings at which the whole assembly joined in singing Sir Hubert Parry's setting of Blake's Jerusalem".* 

She pointed out that many WI members "*would like to sing the song at the upcoming Annual Meeting.*" After an impressive "performance" of Jerusalem at the AGM, the NFWI ran a competition for an "institute song" which ended in Jerusalem being chosen as the official institute's song.

Jerusalem had been used by the National Union of Suffrage Societies in the 1918 celebrations of women's enfranchisement, and many of the leaders of the NFWI, including Grace Hadow, had been part of that struggle to win the vote for women.

By singing Jerusalem, the WI is marking its links with the wider women's movement, and its commitment to improving the conditions of rural life.
