# AUTUMN MEETING, SATURDAY 18<sup>TH</sup> OCTOBER AT ST PETER'S SCHOOL, CLIFTON, YORK, YO30 6AB 10.30AM – 3.30PM



We will be welcoming as our morning guest speaker David Wiseman, a former captain in the Army, who after being wounded seriously, played a key role helping to plan and coordinate the London inaugural Invictus Games in 2014, as well as competing as a swimmer. The injury he suffered brought an end to his military career. Being a soldier meant the world to him, but the impact of what had happened caused major psychological and physical wounds. For him, swimming has acted as a therapy to deal with the

mental health problems predominantly linked with a mass casualty incident he witnessed, rather than his own brush with death.

Our afternoon speaker will be Lucy Allen, an artiste performing numerous stunts for film and TV in popular favourites such as Casualty and EastEnders, as well as Oscar winning films – Titanic and Braveheart. She doubled Helena Bonham-Carter as Bellatrix in the Harry Potter films. Lucy will talk about the thrills and spills of being a Stunt Performer. She will explain her own backstory and how she got into this exciting profession, a profession that sometimes requires you to put your life on the line! She will talk about "Highs" and "Lows" of her chosen profession, which she has been doing for over thirty years now, and will share her experiences both scary and hilarious at times, doing the job she loves.

#### The Sky at Night at York University Observatory

Explore the wonders of the universe at the Astrocampus, the University of York's observatory, Heslington, York YO10 5NA, on Monday 27<sup>th</sup>

**October at 6.30pm**. Join us for an evening exploring the stars. Tour the observatory and discover what to look for in the night sky. When the weather allows, observe the Moon, planets,



and/or stars with telescopes and binoculars. Even if the weather lets us down, find out about meteors and handle a genuine meteorite, and investigate how space telescopes work with an interactive talk.



Events go ahead whatever the weather. You will be outside for at least part of the evening, so please dress for the weather. Wear warm layers if it's cold and bring an umbrella/waterproof if it's raining. There are gravelled paths between the buildings, so you shouldn't get muddy. However, we recommend that you wear flat shoes. The site and most of the buildings are wheelchair accessible. However, the main dome is not; so please let us know when booking if you require

At the Special Board meeting it was decided that the Science and Climate entries in the magazine would appear under the same heading; the new title being Environment and Science. It is hoped that with a more general title it will be easier to discuss current environmental issues .... for me, only one report!!! I think we all know how important these environmental issues are to ourselves.
