NFWI AGM, Wednesday 4th June 2025



On a lovely sunny morning around 40 ladies gathered at the Galtres Centre, Easingwold, for a WI Companies Act Meeting and Annual Meeting. There was a feeling of slight anxiety amongst those eligible to vote as we tapped in the Wi-Fi password and found the links to Zoom and Election buddy.

Jeryl Stone (NFWI Chair) opened the Companies Act Meeting. The constitutions were last updated in 2021 in order to reflect necessary updates associated with meetings during Covid, but prior to this a full review had not been undertaken since 2013. Many things have changed since then and NFWI proposed to modernise and update the constitutions. The changes have been made whilst remaining in line with legislative requirements and best practice. All four resolutions were passed.

The Annual Meeting followed a short coffee break. In true WI fashion there was a resounding rendition of Jerusalem. Jeryl's opening address included a welcome to all new and returning members. She reflected on the activities of the previous year and explained that a significant amount of money had been saved by having a virtual meeting.

This address was followed by the Treasurer's report. Hilary gave us an update on our income and expenditure. National has agreed in principle to sell 104 New King's Road within the next 5 years but is waiting until the market is right. She finished by saying that this would be her last Treasurer's report.

Three Yorkshire WIs – 2 in East Yorkshire and 1 in West Yorkshire – won prizes for having the greatest growth in membership.

The Resolution – Bystanders can be lifesavers – was proposed and seconded. A representative from the British Heart Foundation spoke for the resolution by giving us a short presentation. She mentioned The Circuit, which is a national defibrillator network which provides the NHS ambulance service with information so that they can respond quickly. She included a real-life example of how a mother's children ran to get help after she had a cardiac arrest which saved her life. As expected, it had been difficult to find anyone to speak against the motion so one of the Trustees put forward the points against. The resolution was passed by over 900 votes.



The morning speaker was Emma Bridgewater who was interviewed by Melissa in a prerecorded video. Her eureka moment for her factory was in 1984 when she couldn't find a pretty cup and saucer for her mother. She decided to create something herself. Emma joined Jeryl in London for a Q&A session afterwards. As well as being a high-profile supporter she is considering becoming a member of her local WI.

Angel Strawbridge (and Dick) joined us via Zoom from their chateau in France. Angel has always been a collector of vintage items (including many tea sets) and after working as an accountant decided to set up the Vintage Patisserie. She has written many books, and along with Dick, has renovated the Chateau de a Mote Husson. Angel is also a high-profile WI supporter.



Jeryl's closing remarks touched on possible changes in the future. She said that National is listening and acting on suggestions made by the membership. These changes include rethinking the WI portion of the subscriptions.

The meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem.

We all agreed that the Galtres Centre was a great venue for the Watch party and the transmission was excellent.

Our thanks to Laurence for all her hard work organizing it. There was a great atmosphere, and everyone had plenty of time to mingle.

Next year's meeting is on Thursday 4th June 2026.

IMPORTANT - FEDERATION GENERAL MEETING, THURSDAY 24TH JULY, 10.30AM. Your Secretary will have been made aware that should the changes to the Constitution be approved on 4th June at The Companies Act Meeting, our Federation would have one more formality to complete, and that is to ratify the changes to the new model Constitution for Charitable Incorporated Organisations. As our Federation became a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) in April 2021 and changes to the constitution were approved on 4th June, we are required to hold a General Meeting of North Yorkshire East Federation to adopt the constitutional change being presented for CIOs.

A General Meeting of the Council of the Federation means that every WI in the Federation has a vote on this and should be represented by a Delegate.

We will therefore be holding a General Meeting via Zoom on 24th July and will need the name of a Delegate for each WI by 8th July at the latest. We will announce the results of the votes after the meeting on 24th July.

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CURRENT AFFAIRS

Now we're into summer it won't be long till a campaign pack for the new national resolution - on CPR training and defibrillator supply - emerges. Let's not forget that all of the campaigns which have followed the annual resolutions are still worthwhile, and for action if any attract your group's interest. Similarly, possible resolutions can be prepared at any time of year, ready for submission in September, if and when your group decides to put forward a particular cause.

In the meantime, this is Plastic Free July - a global version of the WI's campaign, encouraging us to act on reducing single-use plastic wastage.

It's now 150 years since the Yorkshire Association of Change Ringers was formed - there are still some 350 local churches with active bell-ringers - in England's green and pleasant land.

July 20th and 21st are memorable days, on which back in 1969 the first landing on the moon and the first moonwalk, by Apollo 11's Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin, were achieved. (The first and last time many of us watched television at 3.45 am.)

Our planet's condition has been addressed by Parliament in various ways over recent years. Currently a private member's bill on Climate and Nature, the CAN Bill, is due its second reading this month, as a bid to enforce Government work on relevant targets, with a strategy to achieve those targets on which a Climate and Nature Assembly would advise. There is some doubt whether this will successfully pass into law, but we have anyway publicised our endorsement with the bill's campaigning organisation Zero Hour. Thanks to Dunnington WI.

ENVIRONMENT & SCIENCE

Water - Rain - when we have got it we don't want it and when we haven't got it, we want it. The source of the UK's moist air normally comes from the tropics. The warm moist air picks up water vapour as it travels up the Eastern Atlantic Ocean. When it reaches the high ground of the western coasts of the UK it falls as rain. Water authorities process this water to make it fit for us to drink. It has been announced that a total of ten reservoirs will be built and in service by 2040. Although two could be in operation considerably earlier.

Sometimes the sheer quantity of rain results in flooding. A truly heartbreaking situation, seeing your home ruined by water, and for farmers to see their crops ruined. Conversely, very long periods of hot dry weather can have terrifying consequences. Tinder-dry moorland and heaths can easily ignite leading to many square miles of burning land. This can be caused by careless actions by humans.



What can we do to help the environment? We can try and use less water - Do not leave taps running; Save washing-up water to water garden plants; When wanting hot water, run the first part of cold into a container and then use it to flush the loo, or water indoor plants; Water the garden with a watering can not a hosepipe; Shower instead of bathing.

Today, here in the UK, on large and small housing developments many of the houses have three and even four cars parked. Many have paved over their

driveways and front gardens to create more parking spaces. This does cause a problem because when rain falls it cannot be absorbed by the ground - it just flows away into the drains, causing the drains to be over-worked and the result can be flooding. Water, we cannot live without it...we must manage it and respect it. *Gill Edmonds*

used to the equipment and then it was on to our choice of item and


designs.
